de Jager's of Ulcombe

In praise of a Former Sponsor

Back in 2018 I was a member of the Smarden WI Centenary Planning committee. Another member, from memory Monica Harding (apologies if I'm wrong) was tasked with asking local bulb suppliers, de Jagers, if they would sponsor some daffodil bulbs for us to plant outside the Charter Hall. This would be a gesture to mark, hopefully for several years to come, our centenary. Their response was immediate and positive. Not only did they say "Yes", but when a number was given by us, they said "Is that all? Have more". When the bulbs were delivered, in the autumn, they proved to be top quality. Each bulb was the size of a small globe.

Arrangements for a group of WI volunteers to plant in October hit a snag. A lengthy dry spell had rendered the ground impenetrable! Roping in some husbands, and after some rain to soften the ground, the bulbs were finally planted in November 2018. There were sufficient for:

- Round the Charter Hall sign;
- Sprinkled across the grass opposite, at the start of Chessenden Lane;
- All down the window side of the Charter Hall.


As you may have observed, not only was there a magnificent display in March 2019, this was repeated this March.


Partly out of a sense of gratitude, and also to support the Smarden Gardeners' Society (newish) Spring Show, I ordered about £50 worth of daffodils, tulips and alliums. Planted last September/October they have provided a brilliant display, and I can kid myself they would have won awards at the Spring Show – scheduled for 4th April 2020 but obviously cancelled! The bulbs are initially slightly more expensive than those in regular garden centres, but this has to be off set against no failures, or no distorted plants. There has been 100% germination and flowering.

A Valuable Community Resource

In one of my last conversations with Angela Wilson at a Monday "Drop in" session at the Charter Hall (before "Lockdown"), she mentioned the drastic drop in income being felt by the Charter Hall, as – at that time – about half the bookings for the current week were being cancelled. This was the last week before everything shut down. Currently the income of the hall must be nil. Yet they still have ongoing costs like gas, electricity and rates to pay.

My view of the hall is that it is a fantastic resource for the Smarden community. I have attended WI meetings in Bethersden, Egerton, Westwell and Swan (Ashford). Egerton comes close in quality to our hall, but all the others are of far inferior quality, mainly due to their age. Almost all of our speakers comment on how attractive our venue is, and stress how fortunate we are.

Something to consider, when all this "shut down" is over, by our committee and then membership, is making a donation to the Charter Hall to keep it viable. Our outgoings, for the next few months might be (approx):

Total	£300		

Against this, there would have been some income generated:

Raffle + Sales table (approx) <u>£30 x 4 months</u> Total £120

Even on these very rough figures, our WI should have £180 in hand. Could we not donate a modest amount to our landlord (Charter Hall), to keep it viable? You could argue why we are paying for meetings that never took place. The counter-argument is to take the broader view, and consider the inestimable value of the resource in our midst. Other clubs could (should?) follow our lead.




